

Mortality

National Annual Mortality from Drugs, Alcohol and Tobacco	
Tobacco-related deaths	556,000 ¹
Tobacco deaths of those with mental health and substance use disorders	200,000 ²
Alcohol-related deaths	88,003 ³
Opiate overdose deaths	47,600 ²
Total drug-related deaths	70,237 ²

More than 200,000 Americans coping with a mental illness or other addiction die from smoking every year.

Why?

- Addiction treatment programs are not treating tobacco use disorders the way they treat alcohol, opiate and other substance use disorders eligible for addiction treatment even though tobacco dependence is a well-recognized addiction.
- Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable disease and death among those with behavioral-health disorders.
- Our behavioral health providers already have the skills, knowledge and programs to provide.
